- Expand opportunity for all Nebraskans.





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



LISTEN. ENGAGE. RESPOND.

\$60 million (\$10 million per college) for capital or programs that support workforce development; \$15 million for to cover tuition costs of dual-credit courses for high school students

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Nebraska Resident Teleworkers (LB1094/LB1150*)

Resident teleworkers are eligible under ImagiNE Nebraska economic incentives program

Career Scholarship (LB902)

Formalize in statute scholarships program for high-demand, high-skill careers, increase awards to \$15,000 maximum, and add programs; launch Grand Island partnership with Wayne State College

Computer Science Graduation Requirements (LB1112)

Add five credits of computer science to high school graduation requirements and incorporate instruction in elementary and middle school



COMPETE IN TAXES

Action Plan

Cut individual and corporate income taxes and achieve corporate parity, ensuring all types of Nebraska businesses pay the same tax rate. Achieve sustained property tax relief, and modernize key tax incentives to support workforce, community and innovation needs.





2022 Tax Cuts Package (LB873/LB825/LB939)* \$900 Million - Largest in Nebraska History

Individual Income Tax Relief

Reduces the top individual income tax rate from 6.84% to 5.84% by 2027.

More Tax Results

Sales Tax (LB984/LB881/LB941)

Doubles reimbursement to businesses for sales tax remittance to \$150/month; exempts net wrap for hay bales and feminine hygiene products

Agriculture, Ethanol and Manufacturing (LB1261/LB596)

Extends Nebraska Advantage Rural Development Act for livestock development through 2027, increases credits available from \$1 million to \$10 million, and increases refundable tax credits for 10% of investment; ensures manufacturers with locations in both rural and urban areas can participate in ImagiNE Nebraska incentives; creates retailer tax credits for sales of E15 (5 cents/gallon) and E25 (8 cents/gallon)

Inheritance Tax (LB310)

Increases exemption amounts and reduces inheritance tax rates for certain beneficiaries

Defeated

Consumption Tax Proposals (LR264CA* - Defeated on Floor)

A constitutional amendment for the 2022 ballot that would have repealed income, sales and property taxes and replaced them with a statewide retail consumption tax

Hospital Property Tax Exemptions (LB784 - Held in Committee)

Limited property tax exemptions in proportion to percentage of gratuitous service with requirements to allow all licensed medical practitioners in the community access, unless good cause is shown

Financial Institution Franchise Tax (LB1225 - Held in Committee)

Repealed the franchise tax (deposit tax and limitations) and replace with corporate income tax

Tax Bracket Expansion (LB832 - Held in Committee)

Created two tax brackets above the current top maximum rate of 6.84% at 7.75% and 8.25%

School Property Tax Spending Limits (LB986* - Stalled on Floor)

Limited growth in school district property tax totals proportionally with CPI or certain student enrollment indicators, unless allowed by a public vote or majority of school board members

Income Tax for Personal Services (LB936 - Held in Committee)

Clarified de minimus income tax exemptions when out-of-state employees or associate income is not taxable in Nebraska

Action Plan

Amp up private and public physical infrastructure investment. Accelerate industrial and commercial site development plans in more communities, and put Nebraska on the map for mega-site development.

More Infrastructure Results

Broadband Expansion (LB1144/LB761/LB914/LB1021/LB1214/LB1234)

Extends deadlines under Broadband Bridge Act and decreases required match in high-cost areas; establishes \$2 million precision ag infrastructure grant; grants Public Service Commission mapping responsibility; encourages competitive rates for service; and expedites permitting across railroad tracks

Airport Service (LR283CA)

Constitutional amendment for 2022 ballot, granting local political subdivisions authority to expend revenues for the purpose of expanding air service




Allocate \$150 million in funds to identify and prepare two mega-sites for transformational projects (Eastern and Western Nebraska)

ImagiNE Nebraska Revolving Loan Fund (Budget Adjustments)

Fully fund to \$20 million through 2024, allowing more employers to borrow against future tax credits to support infrastructure, job training, talent recruitment, childcare or transportation expenses

More Community Results

Childcare Expansion (Budget Adjustments)

\$4 million available for grants to expand or start childcare programs up to five years of age in areas of need

Small Business Stabilization (LB598)

Offers grants of up to \$12,000 to Nebraska businesses with \$1 million or less gross revenues and suffering 50% revenue losses due to future natural disasters or declared emergencies

Attracting and Retaining 24-Hour Caregivers (Budget Adjustments*)

\$47.5 million for incentive payments for direct-care staff at licensed and Medicaid-Certified nursing facilities

Rural Health Complex (Budget Adjustments)

\$60 million for a joint University of Nebraska at Kearney (UNK) and Medical Center Rural Health Complex housed at UNK

Water Sports, Recreation and Tourism – STARWARS (LB1023/Budget Adjustments)

\$200 million in one-time funding remove to:

- Build a new marina and amenities at Lake McConaughy, plus road safety improvements
- Replace a Niobrara River boat access facility in Knox County to promote hunting and fishing industry
- Construct an event center and lodge at Niobrara State Park
- Expand marina at Lewis & Clark Lake
- Lower Platte River flood control
- Add a 4,000-acre reservoir between Lincoln and Omaha


US SPACECOM/Offutt Air Force Base (LB1232/LB1233/Budget Adjustments*)

Repurpose \$50 million previously committed to attract US SPACECOM to Nebraska toward support for Offutt Air Force Base profile and base enhancement projects; \$20 million to help build a U.S. Strategic Command Nuclear Command, Control and Communications facility through public/private partnerships

Revitalize Main Streets (LB701 - Stalled on Floor)

Extended the Nebraska job Creation and Mainstreet Revitalization Act (Nebraska Historic Tax Credits) through 2027 to support both commercial and residential downtown revitalization plans





PROTECT OUR BUSINESS CLIMATE



Action Plan

Promote free markets and preserve our competitive business climate. Reduce the cost of regulation and doing business in Nebraska when possible. Defeat proposals that threaten economic competitiveness and job creation.



Results in Competitiveness

Unemployment Adjudication (LB567)

Retains streamlined pandemic-era unemployment adjudication practices in which only the most recent job separation is adjudicated; a charging decision for each job separation is still delivered, which employers have a right to appeal

Employment of Minors & Short-Time Compensation (LB780)

Eliminates the requirement to publicly display the names of minors employed and the ability for schools to approve labor certificates; grants the Labor Commissioner authority to provide a good cause exception for employers who do not meet requirements of the short-time compensation program to participate

Employer-Mandated COVID-19 Vaccines (LB906*)

Amendments negotiated ensure employee exemptions from employer-mandated COVID-19 vaccines align with federal language and current standard; neither requires nor restricts an employer's ability to mandate vaccines

Defeated

Right to Repair (LB543 - Stalled on Floor)

Required equipment manufacturers to make documentation, parts, tools, and software available to the owner or an independent repairer for electronics-enabled agricultural equipment

Pipeline Reclamation (LB1186 - Held in Committee)

Classified oil and carbon dioxide as hazardous liquids subject to new local reclamation and state decommissioning requirements, including establishing a trust fund for the reclamation process – all beyond existing permit requirements

Personal Data (LB1188 - Held in Committee)

The Uniform Personal Data Protection Act would have regulated how businesses collect, control and process sensitive or personal data of individuals beyond federal law

Unemployment Benefit Expansion (LB931 – Held in Committee)

Paid vacation remitted to an employee upon separation would not count toward compensation that must expire before eligibility for unemployment benefits, creating a potential double-pay scenario

Fair Employment Practice Act (LB1029 - Held in Committee)

Created a new class of employers (Class II – with less than 15 employees) subject to non-discrimination regulations beyond what is currently required by law for small businesses

Product Liability (LB694 - Held in Committee)

Extended the statute of limitations from four years to 10 for exposure to certain chemicals, prescription drugs or medical devices

Workers' Compensation (LB719 - Held in Committee)

Significantly increased many provisions of workers' compensation benefits and costs to employers

Innovation Results

Hydrogen Hub Industry Work Group (LB1099)

Creates a work group of manufacturing, agriculture, transportation and energy and clean hydrogen representatives to apply to be one of four U.S. Dept. of Energy regional clean hydrogen hubs authorized in the federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act

Agricultural Innovation Facility (Budget Adjustments*)

Creates the Agricultural Research Service National Center for Regenerative and Resilient Precision Agriculture on the University of Nebraska – Lincoln Innovation Campus

Expand Business Innovation Act (LB598/LB1163)

Increases total program award limits under the Business Innovation Act from \$4 million to \$6 million, to expand early-stage capital support to entrepreneurial firms developing products

Innovation Hubs (LB450/LB1215/LB1024)

By designating an area as an iHub, the Nebraska Dept. of Economic Development encourages tech, financial, education and nonprofit partners to build entrepreneurism in historically underserved communities; up to \$5 million in Small Business Assistance Grants is targeted to entrepreneurs in these areas

In Progress

R&D Tax Credits (LB701 - Stalled on Floor)

Extended the Nebraska Advantage Research & Development Act by one year to encourage private investment in local economies and higher learning institutions

Business R&D Grants (LB699 - Held in Committee)

Established a robust, one-time 1:1 matching business grant program based on the Nebraska Asset Modernization Initiative with the Nebraska Investment Finance Authority to support technology adoption and traditional R&D, including planning, engineering, and administrative costs

Workforce & Economic Development Dashboard

The dashboard, developed in partnership with eIMPACT offers NE Chamber members and the public quick access to trends and demographics.

Leadership Nebraska

The network of alumni dedicated to lifelong learning and community leadership now stands at 320 strong, including some elected officials.

Nebraska Business Hall of Fame

Inducted three more impactful business leaders into the Nebraska Business Hall of Fame, bringing the total to over 130 honorees recognized by the NE Chamber and University of Nebraska – Lincoln College of Business.

Hall of Fame Scholarships

Six more Nebraska college students were awarded \$2,000 each in scholarships to support their education in business fields, bringing the total to \$226,000 to 113 students.

Workforce Grant

The NE Chamber Foundation, NE Chamber and NE Manufacturing Alliance applied for the U.S. Economic Development Administration's Good Jobs Challenge, supporting work to build demand-driven, skills-based training to meet future workforce needs.

Nebraska Manufacturing Advisory Council Chair Scott Volk joined the NE Chamber Board in early 2021.
