Legislative Forums Held Across Nebraska

The State Chamber, in cooperation with local chambers of commerce across Nebraska, is nearing the conclusion of its annual legislative forums – held every autumn to gather input from the business community on legislative concerns and key economic issues. Approximately 1,200 people had attended the forums as of the deadline for this issue of *The Executive*. Nearly 40 state senators had also participated in the presentations.

This year's forum presentation has highlighted Nebraska's competitiveness compared to neighboring states, in important areas such as taxes and the cost of doing business. The forums have also included a review of the Legislature's 2009 session, emphasizing developments in the areas of labor

law, workers' compensation and economic development.

Forum attendees were told that while Nebraska is still considered a high-tax state, conditions have recently improved for businesses. The forums have featured notable economic rankings, including one from the Tax Foundation that shows Nebraska has become more business-friendly over the past year. The foundation's business tax climate index ranks Nebraska as 33rd best – up nine spots from last year's ranking of No. 42. Nebraska continues to receive high marks for its legal environment and cost of doing business.

"From Omaha to Scottsbluff, the economy continues to be the top issue facing our business community and employers," said State Chamber

President Barry Kennedy.

The State Chamber legislative forum tour will conclude in Lincoln. The Lincoln forum will be held October 28 at 7:30 a.m. at the Nebraska Club. Call the Lincoln Chamber of Commerce at (402) 436-2385 for more details. ■

You are a valuable partner to the Nebraska Chamber of Commerce & Industry, and we will work hard to be a valuable partner to your continued success. 2010 Annual Meeting Set for February 4

Mark your calendars for the State Chamber's 2010 Annual Meeting and Legislative Caucus, set for Thursday, February 4, at The Cornhusker Marriott in Lincoln.

This is the State Chamber's largest event of the year. Those attending will learn about key legislative issues impacting the business community. Attendees will also get the chance to meet with Nebraska lawmakers, state officials and policy experts, as well as pay tribute to some of the state's top business leaders.

Late registration will begin in the atrium of The Cornhusker Marriott at 9 a.m. The Board of Directors meeting will start at 10 a.m. Governor Dave Heineman will address the noon luncheon, which will be open to all State Chamber members. The afternoon will commence with the annual business meeting, followed by panel discussions led by key experts and lawmakers. Panel topics will cover workforce preparedness, federal issues, and the priorities of the Legislature's leaders.

The evening will include a 6 p.m. reception and annual banquet at 7 p.m. The traditional passing of the gavel will feature 2009 State Chamber Chairman Marc LeBaron of Lincoln Industries, Lincoln, and 2010 Chairman Richard S. Reiser of Werner Enterprises, Omaha. The Business Hall of Fame induction ceremony will begin at 8 p.m., with closing comments by Chairman Reiser. ■

Nebraska Gets High Marks In New Rankings For Business Conditions, Energy Costs

Forbes Magazine has named Nebraska as its No. 9 "Best State for Business." According to the magazine's Web site, Forbes' 2009 "Best States" ranking measured six vital categories for businesses: costs, labor supply, regulatory environment, current economic climate, growth prospects and quality of life. Business costs – which include labor, energy and taxes – were weighted the most heavily. Nebraska scored especially well in the categories of business costs and quality of life.

In another recent study, Nebraska is ranked No. 7 for overall energy costs. The 2009 Energy Cost Index compiled by the Small Business & Entrepreneurship Council considered the two major energy costs affecting small businesses – the retail price of

regular gasoline and the cost of electricity.

Only four states have more affordable electricity rates than Nebraska, according to the SB&E Council index. In the overall rankings comparing all states and the District of Columbia, Wyoming is No. 1; Hawaii ranks

No. 51 with the nation's highest energy costs. Of the 10 worst-ranked states – those with the highest energy costs – eight are located in the Northeast United States, where environmental restrictions and energy development regulations are most stringent. ■

Upcoming Workshop on Lobbying and Campaign Finance

State Chamber members are encouraged to attend an upcoming workshop covering some basic rules for lobbying in Nebraska.

On November 10, the State Chamber will host a workshop addressing Nebraska's lobbying and campaign finance regulations. It will be held from 9 a.m. to noon at The Cornhusker Marriott in Lincoln and will serve as either a first-time instructional course or a refresher.

The workshop will feature Frank J. Daley, executive director of the Nebraska Accountability and Disclosure Commission, who will review state laws impacting campaigns and campaign contributions, as well as necessary legal information for lobbying at the state level.

Cost to attend is \$75 for State Chamber members and \$100 for non-members.
